
**Brock Robinson**

#### **Programmatic Efficiency**


This fiscal year, our notable expenses included several impactful initiatives and necessary operational investments. We invested significantly in Phase One of the Dead River Community Forest (DRCF) project and expanded our stewardship staff to support its establishment. Additionally, UPLC organized educational events to promote environmental engagement among community members.


These activities were complemented by our commitment to maintaining a high standard of service and programming, reflected in our investment in the Land Trust Accreditation Commission renewal. These expenditures highlight our dedication to environmental stewardship, community education, and operational excellence.

#### **Grants & Support**

UPLC was awarded nearly \$115,000 in grants in 2023. The U.P. Environmental Coalition and Ray & Peg Hirvonen Foundation supported our efforts to improve access at the Dead River Community Forest (DRCF) Bayou parcel. Additional funding from the Land Trust Alliance provided UPLC with the opportunity to strengthen partnerships focused on the DRCF.

Most notably, the majority of support came from individuals like YOU! Through your generosity, and along with the assistance of local grantors, UPLC was able to unlock a \$120,000 matching grant in 2024 from The Carls Foundation to expand operations and accelerate our conservation initiatives.





#### Investments

UPLC has a promise to protect land forever, and in fact it's our mission: Land Today for Life Tomorrow. It's a gift and a challenge to steward this incredible landscape for future generations of students, families, and outdoor explorers. UPLC ensures we remain prepared yet adaptable by managing a diverse portfolio of assets which display our commitment to the land. Across all funds, UPLC investments saw a net gain of \$45,930.99 in 2023.

## THE CARLS FOUNDATION CHALLENGE GRANT

2023 was a momentous year for fundraising. At the start of the year, we graciously accepted a 3-year challenge grant from The Carls Foundation to support UPLC's growing operations. The "challenge" of this multi-year grant is that we must match the Foundation's annual gift with qualifying donations, grants. and other contributions from local community members and visitors. Through your support of the Accelerating Conservation Campaign. UPLC reached our Year One goal of raising \$120,000 by the end of 2023. With the generosity of our community and the conditional matching grant received in Q1 2024, our fundraising totaled \$347,422! Now, we're striving to outdo ourselves and raise \$130,000 to unlock Year Two's match and double it once again! #### ONTONAGON OUTREACH

During the summer field season, we broadened our outreach efforts westward to Ontonagon. Staff were delighted to connect with local government officials, American Legion Post 92, and members of the public during their lively Copperfest event. We were privileged to engage with this community and share our mission that spans across the Upper Peninsula. In 2021, we proudly safeguarded the Dempsey Preserve with the support of donors near and far, honoring the memory of Michael Dempsey. In 2023, we celebrated the culmination of our efforts to protect this land with a picnic and trail dedication ceremony with the Dempsey Family, a tangible symbol of our enduring commitment to the preservation and enjoyment of nature today and into the future. UPLC is excited to participate in Copperfest again in 2024!


#### LTAC ACCREDITATION RENEWAL

In 2023, the staff and Board combined forces to submit our application for accreditation renewal through the Land Trust Accreditation Commission. This comprehensive process is a voluntary review where we demonstrate how closely we are abiding by nationally adopted Land Trust Standards and Practices. Our materials and procedures are subjected to a rigorous external review, where we are scored on various performance measures and advised of any adjustments. This renewal happens every 5 years, where the frequency allows us to make and practice meaningful changes. We hope that by demonstrating a high level of fiscal control, donors and grantors have an even greater level of trust in supporting our work. We are excited to report we were awarded the status of reaccreditation! With this distinction and the support of the Land Trust Alliance, we look forward to the next 5 years of growth and development.

#### **NEW INTERNSHIP OPPORTUNITIES**

2023 saw the creation of a new internship position—the Land and Community Steward. Our monitoring intern, Casey Stevens, inspired us to develop the position through her passions for partnerships and communications. With this pilot program, we focused on the Dead River Community Forest and created an engagement plan to foster new community connections while continuing to build upon past work with our existing partners. The internship also focused on storytelling in person and the virtual space.

Casey did an amazing job setting up the framework for this new position, and we are excited for its return in 2024. We look forward to seeing how this position will grow our community relations through the addition of new ideas and visions for outreach.



## **Community Programs**

**Events, Outings, & Education** 

With incredible partners, volunteers, and an involved community, UPLC hosted over 20 events in 2023; including mushroom hikes, volunteer stewardship days, the Chocolay Bayou Art Walk, and library programs.









### **New Opportunities to Explore**

With the help of volunteer and mental health professional, Sean Fitzpatrick, LPC, UPLC introduced a new program — Wellness in the Woods. Through guided walks, participants are encouraged to find moments and space to reconnect with nature, reducing mental health stressors along the way. Kindling these relationships with the land helps people bond with nature, as we protect what we love and we love what we feel connected to.

In 2023, UPLC also collaborated with outdoor educator and volunteer, Holli Langlieb, to enhance our program offerings and strengthen our connections with members of the Northern Center for Lifelong Learning as well as local youth at North Star Montessori Academy.

## Dead River Community Forest

## Step by Step: Crafting Trails with Nature's Pace in Mind

Before we developed trails at the DRCF, we planned out thoughtful steps regarding the land we walk on; the surrounding ecology, the communities needs, our capacity, and the sustainability of our actions. In our first field season since acquiring DRCF, we made great progress through our Phase One access project.

Here are some steps we took to get there...

Improved Road to Vielmetti-Peters Reserve

Installed culverts, cut back overhanging trees, graveled and graded road

Constructed
Parking Lot &
Fences

Created a brand new parking area at the entrance to VPR & installed fencing barriers Removed old Midway Creek Bridge

Hauled away the deteriorated bridge & began designs for a new footbridge

Native Plant Seeding along Road

Sowed native seeds awarded by Project Wingspan along the improved road

## **Looking Ahead**

There is still a lot of work ahead of us before we can formally invite the public onto the trails at Dead River Community Forest. We are currently setting up biological and cultural surveys to identify sensitive areas, working with the American Bird Conservancy to restore forest & bird habitat, and planning boardwalks by the river to keep the public and waters safe.

## **Hiring an Executive Director**

The Board and Staff invested considerable time in finding UPLC's next Executive Director, seeking someone with conservation related experience, community relations, and a passion for UP ecology. After a lengthy recruitment cycle, the hiring team met with John Frye in late December, where that conversation ultimately led to multiple interviews and his hiring. John brings a lot of land trust experience to our organization and looks forward to meeting all of our supporters and partners in 2024.

## **Refining Recordkeeping**

As part of our reaccreditation process, staff scoured past meeting minutes and all property documentation.

Through this intensive process, we gained an invaluable understanding of our history. Ultimately, we decided that a full documentation audit was needed to ensure that we proceed as a stronger organization. We are conducting an internal audit and reorganization of our physical and digital files so that we can secure all originals material offsite and effectively access all of our electronic documentation remotely.

## **Complete Annual Monitoring**

Monitoring is our absolute promise to land donors, supporters, the public we serve, and the land itself. Every year, we are required to monitor and defend all of our conservation easements. preserves and reserves. This task requires a visit to each property, where staff review all activity and uses, such as — inspecting approved timber harvests, looking for signs of trespass, or checking for the presence of invasive species. We are happy to report that we successfully monitored all of our lands in 2023, where we connected with landowners and neighbors while collecting data that guides our stewardship efforts. We look forward to 2024 where we will do it all again!

UPLC officially turned 25 years old on April 23, 2024! We've certainly had quite the journey to get where we are today. Stay tuned for extra celebrations and events as we look back to our roots and forward to our future.
